They were both murdered in Vileyka on June 22, 1941, along with their small grandson.

Chaya Bella Norman (on the left), her brother Nathan Norman, and two cousins.

Nathan immigrated to the United States in the first decade of the 20th century, lived in Los Angeles all his life, founded a large insurance agency and was an amateur painter. Chaya and the cousins were murdered in the Holocaust.

Benjamin Hiller and his siblings in Grojec, Poland.

After the liberation of Buchenwald, seventeen year old Benjamin Hiller came to the United States to his uncle, Samuel Hiller.

His siblings perished in the Holocaust.

Top row (left to right): Willie Glaser (b. 1921) with mother Adele (b. 1895).

Second row: sister Bertha (b. 1930), grandmother Esther Glaser (b. 1860), father Ferdinand (b.1890).

Last row: sister Frieda (b. 1935), brother Leo (b. 1932).

Adele, Bertha, Leo and Frieda perished in Belzec. Ferdinand perished in Auschwitz.

Esther died in "Jüdisches Krankenhaus Fürth", 22 days after Adele and the children were deported.

Willie survived and lives in Montreal. (His sister Lotte was already in England in 1938.)

Seated: Chaya, neé Taube and Ester, neé Muszka (Aaron's wife)

Standing in front: Chana and Josefa (Aaron's daughter, died in Holocaust)

Chana and Sara went to Palestine before 1936.

Chanan went to the U.S. and became Harry Belsky (died in 1987).

Aaron remained in Belchatow and died in the Holocaust with his family.
